


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

# Hong Kong Lawn Bowls Association

## Annual Report 1983



The name of George Souza Jr and Hong Kong will be linked and remembered throughout the Bowling World for the year 1983. George's success at Worthing in the Kodak Masters was resoundly applauded having beaten the Worlds best single players. Then again in Hong Kong's own International Classic Pairs Tournament we saw George with Philip Chok representing Hong Kong to win the title over New Zealand's Phil Skoglund and Peter Belliss. George will be defending his Masters title at Worthing again in 1984 and we wish him every success.

The Hong Kong International Classic Pairs 1983 Tournament was the highlight of the bowling calender and considered by all that attended to be one of the major tournaments in the world. All credit is due to the Organisation Committee headed by Ken Wallis for their hard work and efforts to promote this very successful tournament. The high calibre of overseas players sent to represent their countries is a mark of esteem to Hong Kong. A special mention of appreciation is due to the Hong Kong Bank Foundation, the Hong Kong Government Sports Promotion, the Urban Council for sponsorship, and to our vice Patrons Mr O R Sadick and Mr K L Wong. In the light of this success we are considering the possibility of hosting a Tournament in 1984 rather than the intended biannual tournament. For the first time a pre-tournament singles competition was introduced and this was so popular that it should be a permanent feature of future tournaments. The singles final played between Peter Belliss of New Zealand and John Bell of England was of an unbelievably high standard with neither player deserving to lose. However Peter did emerge a very close winner after an extremely tight game.

We are now working forward to World Bowls 1984 at Aberdeen and our best wishes will be with the Hong Kong team George Souza Jr (Captain.), O K Dallah, Philip Chok, Majid Hassan, Edwin Chok and team manager Ken Wallis.

On the domestic scene the split season has completed its second trial year and is now incorporated in the Bye-Laws. Congratulations are due to the league division winners and also the league sub-committee for the smooth running of the competition. A fourth division was introduced this year and it is very pleasing to note that the newest member Victoria Lawn Bowls Club won this division. The Victoria Lawn Bowls Club has been formed from the beginners training courses at Victoria Park and this augers well for the future of Lawn Bowls in Hong Kong. An interesting feature of the league this year has been the introduction of an individual "skips" table for each division. Competition was extremely fierce as can be imagined and my congratulations are extended to the winners.

The National Competition program was affected by inclement weather and some delay occurred. However due to the efficient efforts of the National Competitions Chairman, Ronson Au, it has been possible to complete the programme. Congratulations to all competition winners and in particular Edwin Chok, the 1983 Bowler of the year.

Again this year we have seen touring parties from overseas in Hong Kong as well as successful touring parties organised by the Kowloon Cricket Club to New Zealand and the Hong Kong Football Club to Sydney Australia. The interchange of touring parties throughout the World is a part of the sport which is most encouraging. Hopefully we may see an official Association overseas tour come to fruition in the not too distant future.

Umpires examinations have been introduced in Hong Kong this year and I would like to extend our appreciation to the Chief Umpire, Brian Douglass in this regard. Through Brian's efforts we should have about ten official umpires from which future National Panel of Umpires can be selected. The introduction of Umpires examinations has realised considerable interest and therefore a better understanding of the Laws of the Game and this can only result in improvement.

It is with deepest regret that we have recorded the deaths of two of our great sportsmen and colleagues. Earlier this year George Souza senior and Sonny Ramchand later. Both were keen supporters, players and previous officers of the Association and they will be missed but remembered.

The conditions of greens in Hong Kong still causes concern and this year has seen the loss of three existing greens at Hong Kong Electric, Police Officers Club and the Royal Hong Kong Police Sports and Recreation Club. Hopefully new greens will be provided soon and we understand artificial surfaces may be introduced. A turf research sub committee has been formed under the chairmanship of Roger Pickford and assistance by the Royal Hong Kong Golf Club and Urban Services Department is grateful received for this specialist subject.

Beginners training courses at Victoria Park are still very popular under the watchful eyes and direction of Tiny Conway and S C Lo. In recognition of them and other bowlers who have assisted regularly in the training schemes the Association has been pleased to appoint ten official coaches. The lack of facilities and in particular the condition and availability of the green at Victoria Park is causing concern and we are actively pursuing the possibility of a second green as well as other locations with the Urban Council.

I thank the Ladies Lawn Bowls Association of Hong Kong for all their assistance this year. It was pleasing to see the first Ladies International Test Series against Australia in Hong Kong and we look forward to seeing future games here. Under the guidance of Sandi Zakske we have Blind bowlers training courses for which I would like to record our appreciation to all those assisting in this worthwhile venture.

In conclusion I offer my sincere gratitude to the Recreation and Culture Sport promotion units, the Urban Council, the Festival of Sport and East Asiatic Co Ltd for their continued support and also to the hardworking officers and general committee of the Association for their assistance and efforts in promoting Lawn Bowls in Hong Kong.

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# The Hong Kong International Classic Paris 1983

## November 22nd — 27th 1983

"The inaugural Classic held in 1981 was an undoubted success in every sense and it has been a burning ambition of the Association to ensure that the tournament would go on . . ." So wrote Ken Wallis, President of the Hong Kong Lawn Bowls Association in his presidential message for the souvenir brochure commemorating the second Hong Kong International Classic Pairs which took place in November 1983. Again the venue was the Kowloon Bolwing Green Club and again overseas bowlers from Australia, England, Ireland, New

Zealand, Scotland and Wales competed along with a Hong Kong team and eight local club selections. An added attraction in 1983 however was the introduction of the Souza Singles, an international Singles competition, which was played during the week-end prior to the Classic and proved to be an outstanding success.

After many long months of organisation and preparation the overseas players finally arrived on Wednesday 16th November and the following day were taken on a tour of the New Territories. A press conference, followed by a welcoming cocktail party, was given at Beasonsfield House on Friday 18th and another cocktail party, this time at Craigengower Cricket Club was held on Sunday 20th at which presentation of the Singles awards was made. A tram trip on the Monday evening completed the 'social whirl' and it was down to the more serious business of international bowls!

With the exception of H.K.F.C.'s Brian Douglass and Tom Blair who reached the quarter-finals and semi-finals respectively, the overseas bowlers dominated the Pre-Tournament (Souza) Singles competition which was played at Craigengower Cricket Club and the Hong Kong Football Club. Peter

Belliss from New Zealand and England's John Bell contested the final which can only be described as magnificent and the capacity crowd which congregated at the Hong Kong Football Club will long remember Peter's 21-19 success against an opponent who matched him wood-for-wood throughout 18 fascinating and intriguing ends of fabulous bowls. All credit must be given to the Fah Wongs at H.K.F.C. for producing the perfect green for the occasion. And so to the main event — the Classic Pairs at the Kowloon Bowling Green Club where the greens again proved a credit to the hard working Fah Wongs.

As with the 1981 Classic the tournament was played in two sections, each section comprising four national and four club sides playing a seven-game round-robin with the top two teams from each section entering the semi-finals.

In the section play there were some very fine games, none better than the England v New Zealand encounter in which England emerged the victors by 16-15, and some notable performances by Hong Kong club selections. Kowloon Cricket Club, represented by John Armitage and Ken Wallis scored emphatic wins over Scotland, Australia and Hong Kong,

Filipino Club's John Fung and Ronson Au surprised England 22-16 whilst Craigengower Cricket Club defeated Scotland and drew with Australia. The real local heroes however were Bill McMahon and Dave Overman of the United Recreation Club who stole the limelight as they stormed to six successive victories in Section 'B', their only defeat coming in the final game and costing them the top spot to their conquerors, New Zealand. Meanwhile Hong Kong's Philip Chok and George Souza Jr. had won section 'A' on shot difference from their clubmates at Craigengower Cricket Club and so the semi-finals pitted the latter against New Zealand and Hong Kong against the United Services Recreation Club.

A very large and enthusiastic crowd were in attendance for the concluding day's play and they were rewarded with some really excellent bowls. In the morning games, U.S.R.C. failed to reproduce their earlier superb form and went down 15-26 to Hong Kong whilst New Zealand overcame stubborn resistance from C.C.C. in a closely fought game, finally winning 20-16.

The finalists had been found — Hong Kong versus New Zealand, and what a final it turned out to be! In the early stages, the tournament favourites Peter Belliss

and Phil Skoglund, delighted the crowd with their firing and resting shots but Hong Kong, inspired by some typical George Souza magic, contained them and at the half way stage held a slender 9-8 lead. This they extended to 15-10 after 16 ends and the excitement and tension mounted as the Hong Kong duo, playing steady and often brilliant, bowls, staved off all of their illustrious opponents attempts to get back into the game. The 20th end was a thriller! Four shots down on the board but lying one shot in a very tight head the New Zealand skip elected to play a precision last bowl in order to move the jack four inches for a count of three. He played it superbly only to see the jack nudged to an opposition wood leaving his side the near-impossible task of scoring five or six shots on the last end. It was not to be for wherever the jack went so too did a Souza bowl. The last wood of a great final, a thundering drive by Phil Shoglund, failed to burn the head and Hong Kong were the champions! Well done Philip! Well done George!

The players assembled on the green, Mr F K Hu, an Urban Councillor, presented the Classic Pairs trophy, two pipers played the Amazing Grace, the flags were slowly lowered and the 'Classic' was over.

In the following few days all of the overseas bowlers departed, each a wonderful ambassador for his country and Hong Kong bowls the richer for the experience.

This superb tournament, organized by the Hong Kong Lawn Bowls Association, was sponsored most generously by The Hongkong Bank Foundation, the Council for Recreation and Culture and the Urban Council with additional patronage from Mr O R Sadick.

It is fitting to conclude by stating that the efforts of the Organising Committee and the generosity of our sponsors and patrons were well rewarded with a truly memorable week of top class, world class, bowls.

Currently George Souza is the outstanding bowler in Hong Kong, with much success having come to him in 1983. In the National League, he has gained another First Division winners' medal with Craigengower Cricket Club, as well as winning the inaugural Skips' competition, losing only one game and drawing one. With the Chok brothers, Edwin and Philip, he has successfully defended his National Triples' title. On the international front, he gained world recognition as one of the best singles players by winning the prestigious Kodak Masters Tournament at Worthing in June, defeating David Bryant in a thrilling final. George finished off the year by beating the best in the Hong Kong International Classic Pairs, with Philip Chok as his partner, in November at K.B.G.C.

George, this year, has possible further success in store, when Hong Kong goes to the World Bowls in Aberdeen in July.

For Philip Chok 1983 has been an outstanding year, even by his own high standards. He has gained a First Division Championship winners' medal for C.C.C., successfully skipping his rink and closely following George Souza's rink in the Skips' table. With George again, and with brother Edwin, he won the National triples, for the second year in succession. The high point of his year must have been in November when he and George Souza beat New Zealand's Peter Belliss and Phil Skoglund in the final of the Hong Kong International Classic Pairs. Further honours seem to be in store for Philip this year when he represents Hong Kong with O.K. Dallah in the Newcastle and District Invitation Pairs in March, and then makes a trip to Aberdeen in July for the World Bowls as a Hong Kong representative.

# Lawn Bowls For The Blind



In the 1982 Yearbook, I reported on the Ladies Lawn Bowls Association's successful experience with Blind Lawn Bowling in connection with the FESPIG Games (Far East and South Pacific Games for the Disabled). Because there were no Hong Kong representatives in that competition, we expressed the hope that we could initiate a training programme for our blind sportsmen and women.

Happily that hope has come true. Our first assistance came from Mr. H.L. Kilpatrick, Western Australia Blind Bolwing Club, who very kindly sent extensive information on coaching the blind. Requests for coaching volunteers received an enthusiastic response from members of the L.L.B.A. and we met to organise plans.

We were definitely lacking in experience, but not lacking in interest and determination. Lesson plans were worked out and we even tried playing blindfolded. This was very helpful and allowed us to more fully appreciate the difficulties involved. Yet we were even more convinced that bowling without sight was possible. By August,

although not convinced we knew enough, we decided to start with the understanding that we were learning as well as teaching.

With the help of Mr. Martin Lam, Sports Association for the Physically Handicapped, who acts as liaison with the Blind Associations and Schools, a course of lessons was offered beginning on October 1st. This class has met once a week at K.B.G.C. and, after eight lessons at this writing, we have a committed group of five from the Hong Kong Society for the Blind who are playing with great interest and skill. Also, a new group of five from the Canossa School for the Visually Handicapped has had four lessons held at K.C.C. and H.K.F.C. and these players are also most enthusiastic.

Of course, none of this would have been possible without the people who have generously offered their help and time: The Committee and members of the Ladies Lawn Bowls Association The Committee and members of the Hong Kong Lawn Bowls Association (Representatives: Nat

Ulla and Daryl Goldby)

The Committees and members of K.B.G.C., K.C.C., H.K.F.C. who have allowed us the use of their greens.

Mr. Bruce Hensel who has offered very helpful suggestions and has offered to donate two sets of size 0 woods.

Our thanks to the above and to all other clubs and individuals for their interest and offers of assistance.

Very special thanks to our volunteer coaches: Rae O'Donnell, Lena Sadick, Shirley Turner, Helen Young, Joan Schlaepfer, Joy Jarvis, Haruko Corley, Margaret Lambert, Ivy Kennedy, Jan Bosley, Jane Leung, Dot Hughes, Linda King, Teresa Huen, Lilian Walton, Thelma Watson, Agnes Cheng, Iain Ross, Tso Hung. (I apologise for any unintended omissions.)

As far as the future is concerned, we hope to continue to develop and expand this programme in every way possible. Our two goals are to offer the social and physical satisfaction of a sport to those who might not otherwise have this opportunity and to offer competition to those who develop sufficient skill and interest.

There is every chance that we will be able to hold a local competition in a year's time and that we will be able to send a team to participate in the World Blind Bowls Tournament to be held in New South Wales, Australia in August/September, 1985.

It is difficult to express on paper the real success of this programme which must be the sincere pleasure and satisfaction that players and coaches have found in this experience. The delighted faces tell the whole story and must be seen to be appreciated.

We welcome anyone who would be interested in helping in any way or in observing the lessons out of interest.

## 1983 National League

The 1983 National League started promisingly with a record entry of 36 teams. Amongst them were two teams from new comers, the Victoria Lawn Bowls Club. With this large entry, the association decided, for the first time in it's history, to introduce a 4th Division in the League.

As the League progressed, it soon became clear that some member clubs were perhaps too ambitious with the number of teams they could put up. After the half way mark, one member club was forced to withdraw its 3rd team and a number of other clubs were also encountering difficulties in fielding a full team in the lower divisions. The situation was not helped by the unusual weather conditions, which proved to be a major headache to convenors in rearranging postponed matches and getting their greens fit for play. In the circumstances it is indeed a credit to all club convenors and ground staff that the League fixtures were completed on schedule. I would like to record my heartfelt appreciation to them for the co-operation and support they gave to the League Sub-committee throughout a difficult season.

As far as the results are concerned in the 1st Division CC-A made it three in a row when it's close rivals failed to maintain consistent form. At the other end of the table HKFC-A was pipped in the relegation battle after a gallant last ditch effort and together with IRC-B will be playing in the 2nd Division next season.

In the 2nd Division, KBGC dominated the scene with their "C" team winning the League and their "B" team gaining promotion as runner-up. The Club will now have three teams in the 1st Division next season, which is indeed a unique record. POC and CSDSA were the two relegated teams in this division.

In the 3rd Division, the honours were keenly fought and in the end, only two points separated the first three teams. FC-B won the League with HUD gaining

promotion and HKCC-A narrowly missing out. HKFC-D and USRC-B were relegated to 4th Division next season. In the 4th Division new comers VLBC-A made an immediate impact and won the League with four points to spare over KBGC-D. The success of the club is a popular and healthy one and we earnestly hope that it will lead to more public participation in this wonderful sport of ours.

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





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# Obituary

## Mr. G. Souza

One of the finest sportsmen ever produced by Hong Kong, George Souza, died from a stroke at the age of 66 in 1983.

Born in Hong Kong and educated at St Joseph's College, Souza was one of those gifted born sportsmen who excelled in any sport he took up. He chose softball and then cricket in his yearly years and was a household name in both sports, being one of the main-stays of the St Joseph's baseball team and Craigengower Cricket Club's cricket side.

The war came when he was just about to win a Hong Kong cricket cap, but the honour did not elude him, for just after the end of the hostilities he won a place in Hong Kong's interport cricket side.

Souza's most notable

achievements, however, were in lawn bowls which he took up after quitting cricket. He was chosen to skip Hong Kong's four at the Commonwealth Games at Perth in 1962, but the Colony team failed to do well. He was again nominated to skip Hong Kong's four at the next Games in Cardiff and this time he succeeded in leading the quartet to a gold medal, which turned out to be the forerunner of many more for Hong Kong in international competitions.

An accident in which he was hit by a passing car and sustained a broken arm prevented him from continuing his international career but locally he went on to win practically every Hong Kong national competition, some of them more than once. His wife, Irene, emulated his feat of winning the

Colony men's singles title by winning the women's event and last year, his son, Souza Jnr, climaxed a remarkable family achievement by chalking up the singles grand slam.

"Old-George" as we usually call him may be no more but the family tradition of fine sporting achievements and high standard of sportsmanship set by him in his lifetime lives on and will no doubt be ably carried on by wife Irene and son Junior for many many more years to come.

## Mr Leonard Clayton (Flit)

It is with deep regret that we record the untimely death of one of the many keen and popular bowlers at the age of 61 at the British Military Hospital on Saturday 7th January 1984. Flit, as he was known to many served thirty-five years in the R.A.F., as a qualified pilot on sixteen types of aircraft. He acquired the nickname of FLIT whilst serving on Christmas Island in the Pacific during the nuclear bomb tests in 1957-58 where his duty involved keeping the massive insect population to a minimum by means of spray insecticide.

Upon retirement here in Hong Kong where he was employed by the ICAC. He never lost contact with the many RAF personnel who flew into Hong Kong, and a drink with 'Flit' at the KBGC was always a highlight of their visit.

He leaves behind an aged Mum in England, his wife Jacqueline, two sons one of whom resides in the UK, the other in Canada and a very large gap in the bowling fraternity. He put a lot into his life but gained even more from it, especially friends.

## MR. S. RAMCHAND

'SUNNY' or 'RAM', as he was affectionately known, served on the H.K.L.B.A. as Hon. Secretary between 1966 and 1970 and then as Vice-President until 1972. At the time of his death he was also a National Selector.

Ram joined the K.C.C. in April 1949 and played cricket for them before turning to lawn bowls, a sport in which he excelled right up to the end. He represented KCC for many years in the 1st Division and in 1966 won the then Colony Pairs with Sonny Lapsley, the first time a K.C.C. pair had won the title. Only days before his death, he skipped one of the two KCC sides which met in the final of the National Fours.

Ram will always be remembered for his quiet disposition, yet highly amusing sense of humour and his passing is the loss, not only of a fine sportsman and respected clubman, but of someone who contributed considerably to the sport of lawn bowls, both administratively and as a player.

Ram is survived by his wife Marie, and, to her, we offer our sincere condolences.

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


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
